MY FRIENDS: WE REMEMBER THOSE WHO HAVE DIED

Although I took four years of Latin in high school, I do not consider myself a Latin scholar. However, one of the things that intrigued me in learning Latin was how succinct the Latin phraseology can be as it defines in a word or two the sentiments of the moment. As we move into November and we find this year drawing to conclusion, the Latin phrase that comes to mind for me describing the kind of year this has been is *annus horribilis*. Translated, this means a *horrible year*. I know this may seem overly dramatic, and really none of us likes to ad-

mit this out loud. However, sometimes life throws enough at you that it is simply the state of affairs at the present time. There are many of you who because of a variety of circumstances and situations you have confronted over the last 11 months probably are finding these two words summing up your experience as well. The hope is that next year will be much improved and the circumstances and situations we are involved in won't demand so much of us as to create the kind of angst in us that this year's experiences did.

Usually in a given year, its successes and failures are what determine whether or not we believe we have had a good year. Sometimes our assessment of a how the year has been depends on the nature of our situations and how they have affected us personally and then spilled over into our family life. Maybe we have had a good year, but somebody close to us has not, and we feel their pain and suffering very deeply. Regardless of what the circumstances of life are, we often find it is better to just carry on and in our off moments or in between times deal with the challenges we face simply by being human and living in the world we do.

Nobody likes to be around people who are always complaining, people whose misery is everybody's misery because they are convinced misery is always better when company is included. The darkness of life and circumstances cannot be tolerated long because we have grown into a way of living that assumes everything can be solved immediately or relatively soon, and if it isn't then the message is take a pill, or just be quiet about it. This is not to indicate there is no room for compassion when people are suffering or going through a tough time. Even the one who bears the suffering will tell you they are tired of talking about themselves and their plight, and they want to draw the attention away from what they are dealing with and look for more hopeful conversation that changes the subject and gets the mind and heart on something else, even if it is for a few moments.

In the world we live, it seems the goal is perfection. Everything is perfect even when it isn't. Letting our experiences, especially the ones that take all our time and thinking and are challenging us to the core of our being, is not something anyone wants to share a cup of coffee over. And yet, truth be told, these difficult moments of our lives don't go away simply because we will them

to. They stay with us; we carry them around, even putting on a pretty face in light of our sadness and pain, and the days when we are unable to cope dictate a lot of what we say and do.

This is evident in every life-changing experience which alters our course of understanding. It may be a terminal diagnosis for ourselves or maybe somebody we care about. It may be the loss of a job and the insecurity and economic upheaval it creates for the individual and family. And the most profound life-changing and challenging event is when someone we love and care about dies and leaves us. Grief sets in. It lingers in places unexpectedly. We are bereft and for a time lost as to how we proceed in life minus the one who has died.

The range of human emotion culminating in the act of leaving this world affects all who are left standing as the grave is closed and the world beckons us back into reality. These feelings experienced are not unique or different. They are personal, and they demand a great deal of attention so the care given and the consolation received can give rise to a new hopefulness about re-entering the world we lived in that had stopped briefly while we said farewell to our dearly beloved departed. The flurry of support and care ends quickly. It always does. The hot dishes stop coming through the front door, the sentiments of sympathy fade, and people move on. The problem is that sometimes, more often than not, we who lose someone stay in the midst of our loss. Indeed time rolls on and makes our grief less harsh and severe. The waves of feelings are not as ferocious and violent, knocking us to the ground as they hit us between the eyes. The darkness which comes from doubt and grief is not as threatening or scary and transitions into more of a grey from black which brings us a little more light to navigate our way through. And eventually, hope begins to overpower despair, and balance in our daily living takes hold.

I often wonder what people who have no faith do when life-changing events take place in their lives. As frail as the church can be sometimes, one of its enduring gifts to believers is to call to mind each time we gather for Eucharist that it and we as a community of faith never forget those who have gone before us in death. Each liturgy, whether it be the Hours prayed daily or the Eucharist celebrated, invites us to pray and remember those who have died. The continued mantra expressed in the context of daily prayer adds richness and value to our own unique set of circumstances that are created when we say good-bye to somebody

we loved. Individuals grieving are reminded they are never alone, and the dead are not dead in Christ Jesus. As they live in God's heart, now in eternal glory, they carry us with them where they have gone. If nothing else brightens our spirits, it should be this thought alone. But we carry them, too. And until the day comes when we are joined together again, however that happens, we remain one with each other.

This weekend the members of Pax Christi will gather to remember those who have died during the past year. The names of those buried from Pax Christi in the past 12 months will be read aloud during the Prayers of the Faithful. Other loved ones who have died in the past 12 months will be held in our silent prayer this weekend, and all will be remembered once again for families and friends still grieving and for a parish community that strives to reach out to the bereaved as they experience deeply the loss of somebody they have loved. Our celebration coincides with the yearly liturgical feast that remembers all souls of our faithfully departed during this month of November. It is the time the church pauses and prays in a particular way for those who have died and now gone home to God. Prior to the Second Vatican Council, the feast of All Souls, and the prayers prayed, and Masses said for the dead were a very big deal. Much attention was given over to these liturgies during those days and individuals attended daily Mass in great numbers honoring their loved ones who died.

While much has changed since those days, the meaning and depth of feeling surrounding a loved one's death has not. While the parish community highlights the memories of our membership who have died, there is also a daily remembrance at every Eucharist we celebrate always praying for those who have gone before us. Our prayer invoked does two things. It calls to mind the way every human being will go. Each of us lives. And, on a particular day, each of us will die. While this is not meant to scare us, this praying unceasingly for our beloved dead helps put in perspective the brevity of our life here on earth.

The second thing our prayer does is to always remember that our eternal character will live forever. This eternal character, our soul, will be united with God once again, and we will be made whole. Every prayer uttered in our gatherings points to and indicates this pending reality. The horror caused by death is real. But one of the redeeming qualities of our life of prayer in the context of the community we celebrate is that as we regain our footing from the losses we endure. We are not alone. We know too, that when we pray and when we remember, the shock of our loss gives way to the bright promise of immortality that all of God's people will experience and be part of when they enter into their eternal rest.

Gracing Life in Uncertain Times

"Change is in the air" is a phrase often used that goes beyond the atmospheric and describes both the feeling and the reality of events within and beyond our control that help to shape our responses. We live in uncertain times, but I suppose every generation could say the same. The challenge for us is adapting to the circumstances in life that has created this uncertainty.

Margaret McCray, D.Min., LMFT, a therapist at Westminster Counseling Center in Minneapolis (mmccray@wpc-mpls.org; www.westminstercounseling.org; 612-332-7743), reflects on life transitions in her article *Things Fall Apart*.

Our present and future security has never depended on our external resources, much as we want to believe it does. Yes, money, education, and health can bring a measure of security and pleasure. Relationships are a harbor in the storm. But there are no guarantees. We can never predict or control the personal tsunamis, tornadoes, fires, and floods that can break into our lives and devastate the landscape we have come to know and accept as "my life." Another truth is: in order to meet the open-endedness that sits forever in front of us, the resources we really need are community, flexibility, and faith.

Community provides a place to tell our story, a place to grieve our losses, to receive and give forgiveness, to be comforted, and to give and receive love and support. Flexibility is an attitude, a willingness that enables us to change directions, discern new insights, shift our focus, imagine, create, and move forward. Faith is the ultimate foundation that survives whatever devastation we may endure. Faith assures us there is hope when we have no hope, there is love when we feel no love, there is a future when we can see no future. Faith is the conviction that the open-endedness is not a black hole but rather a new, unfolding landscape, a place we are always moving towards, a place where we can begin again to build and plant and live. Thanks be to God.

SOCIAL JUSTICE: BECAUSE JESUS SAID SO . . .

Learn More About Cristo Rey High School, November 9, 6:45pm

Pax Christi's justice grant recipients are being spotlighted in a series of Pax CAFÉ programs from 6:45–8:00pm, Wednesdays in the Lighthouse room. Cristo Rey Jesuit High School in Minneapolis is the focus of the November 9 program. All are invited to attend and hear how the justice grant is being used and how Cristo Rey is addressing important social-justice issues. There is no charge and no registration is needed. Here's a profile of Cristo Rey High School:

Pax Christi has been a longtime supporter of Cristo Rey Jesuit High School-Twin Cities, which is committed to providing college-preparatory education and professional work experience to students from under-resourced families in the Twin Cities.

The innovative Minneapolis school that Pax Christi has supported with volunteer time and justice-grant money reached a landmark in June when it celebrated its first graduating class – 61 students, all of whom are going on to either college or military service.

A part of Pax Christi's support has been to seek local companies to be involved in the school's Hire4Ed corporate internship program, a cornerstone of the Cristo Rey program in which firms "hire" a team of four Cristo Rey students to fill a full-time, entry-level job. It's a 9½-month long commitment that allows the students to underwrite up to 70 percent of their educational costs and get real-world business experience. Each student works one day per week and one

Friday each month, structured around his/her school schedule. Local companies like Supervalu Inc. and C.H. Robinson Worldwide are already providing student jobs, but more are needed.

The success of Cristo Rey – which is part of a network of schools nationwide – was celebrated in September when nearly 1,000 people gathered at the Twin Cities school to mark the school's milestones and those of its co-tenant, Urban Ventures. Former NBA star Earvin "Magic" Johnson was a guest at that event.

Come to Pax Christi the evening of Nov. 9 to hear Cristo Rey officials talk about the school and its students and how you can help.

1. Blessing (Oct 30)
2. Dismissal (Nov 6)

Dismissal

“Dismissal” may be a misleading term for this part of the Mass. A better word might be “Commissioning.” We are not just being told it’s time to leave; we are being sent into the world to live what we have celebrated – to be Christ in the world.

The word dismissal has a connection to the word mission. The root word of both of them means “to send.” Two of the new choices for the priest’s part more clearly talk about what we are being sent to do: “Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord,” and “Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life.” We are being sent to fulfill our mission in life, our task as Christians. Pope John Paul II said, “The Eucharistic celebration does not stop at the church door.” We live what we have learned and what we have “rehearsed” at Mass each day of the week.

Roots in Scripture

Then the righteous will answer him and say, “Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you?” And the king will say to them in reply, “Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers or sisters of mine, you did for me” (*Matthew 25:37-40*).

Documents of the Church

The concluding rites consist of . . .

The dismissal of the people by the deacon or the priest, so that each may go out to do good works, praising and blessing God. *General Instruction on the Roman Missal, #90*

You are the Body of Christ. In you and through you the work of the incarnation must go forward. You are to be taken. You are to be blessed, broken and distributed, that you may be the means of grace and vehicles of eternal love. – *Easter Sermon of St Augustine*

Connecting Sunday to the Week

Mass rehearses us in the attitudes and actions that we should have and follow each day. At Mass we have learned how to praise and thank God, how to forgive others and how to accept forgiveness, how to treat others as brothers and sisters in Christ, how to follow the gospel, how to be quiet and listen for God’s voice, how to stand up and profess what we believe, how to pray for others and care about the needs of others, how to offer ourselves to God as Christ offered Himself to God, how to remember and celebrate the Paschal Mystery of Christ’s death and resurrection, how to offer and accept peace, how to become the Body and Blood of Christ, and much, much more. We practice what we have learned and rehearsed. The Lord has truly “taught us to pray.”

New Roman Missal

Our response remains the same.

Priest: Go forth, the Mass is ended.

Or: Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord.

Or: Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life.

Or: Go in peace.

People: Thanks be to God.

ON OUR JOURNEY OF STEWARDSHIP:

PUT ME IN THE GAME, COACH!

The foolish ones said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' But the wise ones replied, 'No, for there may not be enough for us and you. Go instead to the merchants and buy some for yourselves.' While they went off to buy it, the bridegroom came and those who were ready went into the wedding feast with him. Then the door was locked. Afterwards the other virgins came and said, 'Lord, Lord, open the door for us!' But he said in reply, 'Amen, I say to you, I do not know you.' Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour. —Matthew 25:8-13

A bit over a week ago I attended the International Catholic Stewardship Council's Annual Conference, and our keynote speaker the first evening was a real treat. The attendees got to participate in the ultimate huddle when Lou Holtz took the stage. After reigning as one of the most successful football coaches in the history of the game and breaking the hearts of Minnesota Gopher fans when his dream job prematurely whisked him away to Notre Dame, Holtz is now considered a fan favorite on the speaker circuit. In an hour's time, Lou Holtz also managed to win over the hearts of the majority of the conference attendees when he shared his Five Point Plan to successful living which is, not surprisingly, considering the conference at which he spoke, firmly rooted in living the life of stewardship.

Briefly, his points were to:

1. **Believe** – Have faith and keep a positive attitude.
2. **Have the Passion to Succeed** – If you didn't show up at the office, the parish, or your home, would anyone miss you? If no one missed you, then you aren't adding value to your work, your church, or your home.
3. **Focus on YOUR Purpose** – Each has a role and he/she is called to perform that role to the best of his/her ability and in the time allotted. Focus on what you can do, not on what you cannot do.
4. **Be a Dreamer** – "Martin Luther King wouldn't have been as effective if he had said, 'I have a strategic plan.'" Everyone needs something to do, to have, to believe in, to hope for.
5. **Make Good Choices** – Do right, do everything to the best of your ability, and show people you care.

Heavily salted (and peppered) among these tips were anecdotes, both humorous and poignant, about the triumphs and challenges he faced along the way in his fifty years of coaching. By the time he reached the second story, it was obvious how firmly his topic was rooted in stewardship as a way of life. Lou Holtz had a plan for his successful career, and he was motivated to continue working the plan, even when faced with adversity. And when he faced that adversity with his Five Point Plan, he knew he would walk away a winner.

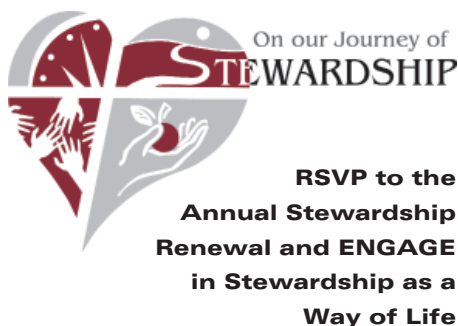
