

A NOTE FROM FR. MIKE BYRON



In the midst of so much national contention over immigration, border control, and refugees, it is helpful, I think, for us to recall that our Catholic doctrinal



tradition is neither silent nor neutral about it all. We may not all be of one mind about which practical policies are most apt for the moment, but we ought at least to know that there are limits to the extent that we may invoke "Catholic" faith as a rationale for our choices. Our Church does, in fact, stand squarely for some fundamental principles, including some of which members of Congress seem either unaware or deliberately dismissive. People are entitled to their politics, but they are not necessarily free to endorse them with a "Catholic" seal of approval. Yes, the gospel is necessarily political.

These issues are not simple, but we are not without guidance from our Church. Among the foundational convictions of Catholic Social Teaching is that human beings, under certain circumstances, have the right to emigrate from their homelands—not merely an option, but a right. When their lives, or those of their families, are imperiled by terror or by the deprivation of the provisions for basic survival, such people are entitled to present themselves at the borders of other nations and to expect a sympathetic hearing/welcome. That's pretty basic Jesus teaching, really, and if we don't understand that, then it's pretty hard to understand who and what we think we are coming to worship each weekend when we gather for liturgy. It is also true, according to our Catholic tradition, that nations have a right to secure their borders against enemies, but that right is not absolute when destitute people present themselves and demand help. Any public policy that would summarily dismiss the cries of refugees and immigrants as a group is something other than Catholic, and actually something less than human. Somebody has to say this out loud in our current climate, and we are the community of Somebody.

Last weekend, on the Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord, I resisted the urge at Mass to point out that the magi from the east could never have gotten to Bethlehem and the manger today, because there is now a concrete wall with barbed wire and sniper/border guards around the town that would prevent any foreigner from paying respects to the Newborn King. This is the whole point of the Epiphany! To the extent that we are complicit in this, let us repent.

The takeaway from the Christmas season is that the world—including the "other"—is our brother/sister, not our enemy. When people, including politicians, present the situation in more selfish and ominous terms, we Catholics have the responsibility to call out the prophets of such falsehood for exactly what they are, and to demand something that is more faithful to Christ
