#### FIRST FRIDAY COFFEE AND CONVERSATION:



# A NOTE FROM FR. MIKE BYRON

#### Dear Friends:

The teenage daughter of a friend of mine recently spent her spring break, as many do, taking a road trip to an exotic southern destination. She traveled by car to visit the Grand Canyon in Arizona. Three things about her story fascinated me. First, by car? Second, she had returned home in



five days. That's right—five days round-trip from St. Paul. Third, she was traveling alone because she wanted it that way. It was a quest to exercise her relatively newfound freedom to do something epic, just because she could. I understand that because I recall the same instincts in me when I was that age. Upon her return home, her mother said, the lesson learned was that future journeys would be better and more happily shared with friends along. I'd call that a wonderful bit of life-learning. The trip was worth it if only for that.

I remember when I was about that age, equipped with a new driver's license. I would occasionally ask to borrow my parents' car, not because I had anywhere in particular to go, but because of the rush that came from a newfound ability to be in control of my own mobility. Freedom! I never went to the Grand Canyon, and in fact I never left town, but there was a thrill in this new capacity to be in charge of my travels. Frequently enough I'd just drive around by myself savoring my independence and my freedom to set the car radio to the station and volume that I wanted. But eventually I came around to the same realization of that young woman: Freedom without friends along doesn't much satisfy the human spirit.

It's not only (or perhaps even primarily) teenagers who can have a kind of distorted understanding of what the word "freedom" means. We all live in a culture in which the idea of freedom tends to indicate a "freedom-from," that is, freedom to do whatever I want without having to render an account of myself to others; freedom from any sort of external constraint, whether parental, legal, social, religious, political, ethical... It's a weird and historically very unusual expression of radical individualism that doesn't always seem so strange to us because we swim in it every day.

To return to the automobile metaphor, do you ever notice the endless TV ads for cars and SUVs in which people are driving vehicles (often alone) over lava rocks, through snowbound forests, barren deserts, mountain ridges, swamps and streams, hauling flatbeds full of old timber logs or front-end loaders? Who does that? Why not just drive on the paved roads and have your lumber delivered by professionals? Because...freedom! Those ads are not accidental.

A biblical and Lenten sense of freedom is something much different. It is a "freedom-for"—a freedom to be untethered from what keeps me and us from becoming what will truly make us happy. Christian freedom is an escape from a lot of falsehood and noise claiming to say, "You have to do this or buy this or believe this or admire this or approve of this...and (ironically) you can decide this all by yourself!" No, freedom in the gospel sense is the ability to embrace what is truly of God, no matter the social or political consequences, and it is not accomplished alone. I hope that this season of Lenten renewal is an occasion to embrace real freedom.
