# A NOTE FROM FR. MIKE BYRON



Dear Friends:

I'm sure there must be a number of Pax Christi people who have some association with St. Olaf College in Northfield. Other than the fact that I wanted to go there when I was young—but my parents wouldn't let me because it is a Lutheran school(!)—I am aware of a few unique aspects of that place. The campus is gorgeous. The musical education pedigree is exceptional, and it's probably the only place in America where the phrase "Um Yah! Yah!" bears any meaning. I know this because my niece studied there, and whenever she encounters people on the streets of the Twin Cities who are wearing St. Olaf attire she shouts out "Um Yah! Yah!" and it is recognized as an intelligible sentiment to the strangers passing by.

I came to learn that St. Olaf is the only college in the country whose fight song is set in three-quarter musical time, like a waltz or a polka. Think of the songs for the Vikings, the Twins, the Gophers, or any other team you know, and they are all brisk 4-4 staccato marches. They are meant to rev you up for battle with their agitating tunes. They are pieces that are easy to yell and scream along with. But, it's harder to be revved up for combat when a melody like The Blue Danube is wafting through the air. (And I came to learn as well that those nonsensical syllables, Um Yah! Yah!, are now over a century old and were just dreamt up ad hoc by the original singers at the college who needed filler for a melody.)

There is something absolutely delightful about that St. Olaf fight song, something that speaks to me of smiling and of putting all contests into perspective. For some reason that song and that sentiment came to mind as we have been nearing the year's end, because when have we ever more needed a good dose of "whoa!" and of perspective? We are currently confronting many very serious and dark challenges as American citizens and as Catholics, and the music of hard combat and strident warfare can be heard in abundance these days. Without for a moment wishing to minimize any of that, perhaps we can use this annual season of calendar-turning as an occasion to reflect upon which fights are worthy of "battle hymns" and which may be closer to "Um Yah! Yah!"

Often the new year presents an occasion to step back and to consider a bigger picture of life. What is unfolding here and what is worthy of our every effort to promote or to fight? Where have we been and what has our recent past done to us? What are the real perils that loom and what is really not so very consequential after all? Let us care viscerally about the things that matter, offer a polite Um Yah! Yah! to those that don't, and let us pray to know the difference.







During this Holy Season we rejoice in the Light and Blessing you are to our parish and our world.
