DEAR FRIENDS...


AMONG the needless worries I've been able to let go of in my advancing age is the New Year's Resolution. By this time I have no doubt at all that any such resolution made in January would be a failed and distant memory in March. It's so much easier just not to attempt a delusional goal in the first place. That's not to say that self-improvement isn't a worthy aspiration and life long value. It is merely to recognize that it's unreasonable, maybe folly, to believe that some well-ingrained bad habit of life can simply be shut down indefinitely by the turning of a

calendar page. Would that we all could be like St. Paul and have our singular, dramatic moment of conversion that alters our life behavior forever. (And some religious people do indeed claim to have experienced this.) It's just that it doesn't typically work that way for me, and I suspect for most people, including all of the rest of Jesus' apostles. And that's really a very human and Catholic instinct.

The moral theological tradition of our Catholic tradition speaks often about the need for the cultivation of virtue, or what St. Thomas Aguinas' Latin referred to as "habitus." and that word implies exactly what it seems to. One develops habits day by day, month by month, and not in a moment. That includes spiritual and religious habits. And this is one of the great gifts of the season of Lent, into which we are now embarking. While the thought of a New Year's resolution quickly proves to be overwhelming because it has no end, the idea of deliberately trying to nurture a good new habit for six weeks seems almost doable. In Lent, one can give oneself permission to be focused on a virtuous initiative for a season that has a beginning (Ash Wednesday) and perhaps an

end (the Triduum). It's humane in its expectations. And if one is generally faithful to a specific Lenten resolution, by the time Easter arrives he or she is already practiced in this new habit for several weeks. It is possible by then to be on the way to a new and better way to live, one that might just be capable of being sustained for the long haul—a virtue.

Recently in one of our weekend scripture readings. we heard from St. Paul (1 Cor. 13) who speaks about the distinction between his "childish" ways as a youth and his "manly" outlook as an adult. I think there's a way to observe the season of Lent as a child and a quite different way to do so as a grownup. Both are age-appropriate, but they are surely not the same thing. A child doesn't necessarily understand how to cultivate virtuous habits. so Lent can tend to be more about "giving up" things for a time or of being made to do some rote act of charity until the Easter Bunny arrives with rewards. But an adult can seize upon this opportunity to make the season more than about temporary self-discipline. It can be a most fruitful time of deepening relationships, with God, with community, and especially with those among



us who are most in need. In that sense it can be an awakening to a new sensitivity to social responsibility and justice that is less narrowly (perhaps "childishly") focused on one's self.

Part of the Pax Christi mission statement stresses that this community is "committed in our discipleship with Christ." Discipleship, although it must include personal commitment, is never something that is radically private. So maybe the greatest Lenten effort we could make to develop or deepen a virtue (one is enough!) would be to find, for 40 days, opportunities to become consciously responsive to the need of some person or group living in our midst. At first that pledge need be for only several weeks, but hopefully by the

time Easter rolls around, it will have matured into a habit that can be sustained. It can actually change who we are, enduringly.

It's in the daily effort to grow in holiness and virtue that we believe, by the help of God's grace, we make our way toward heaven. And we cannot do it in glorified isolation from our neighbors. That task can become wearying unless we allow ourselves to undertake it in digestible increments. Here's a wonderful opportunity to do just that. May this be a blessed season of growth and renewal for us all.



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




DURING THESE sacred days of Lent, we are reminded of our individual and community journey into wholeness as disciples of Jesus. We discover that on our journey of discipleship, we are always connected to one another.









- Through **FASTING**, we encounter our own obstacles, those things about ourselves that prevent us from loving God and neighbor.
- Through **ALMSGIVING**, we encounter our brothers and sisters around the world, asking what we can do without so that others might have life to the fullest.

Each day of Lent, individuals are invited to use the Lenten Calendar—included with every CRS Rice Bowl—to guide their Lenten almsgiving. These daily almsgiving activities—for example, give 25 cents for every faucet found in your home—help families reflect on the realities of our brothers and sisters around the world and how they can be in solidarity during the Lenten season.

All participating parishes are eligible to apply for a grant of up to \$800 to address anti-hunger and poverty initiatives in their community. Pax Christi has been fortunate to receive grants in the past three years to help us fund our YouthLink Meal Service Ministry.

CRS Rice Bowls will be available for families to take home starting the first weekend of Lent. We encourage you to participate in this life-giving, love-giving, transformational journey right in your own home!

THE JUSTICE GRANT BOARD: A MINISTRY OF ENCOUNTER

EACH YEAR, from September to June, Pax Christi members who serve on our Justice Grant Board spend precious time reviewing grant applications from organizations who are doing great work to address the most pressing needs of our time. Grant Board members read mission and financial statements of each organization, and then perform site visits to meet staff and the people they serve. There is no substitute for this face-to-face meeting in which the life and dignity of each human story is revealed. Pope Francis tells us: "When you meet those most in need, your heart will begin to grow bigger, bigger, and bigger! Because reaching out multiplies our capacity to love. An encounter with others makes our heart bigger."

This word to encounter is defined by the Oxford English dictionary as: to "unexpectedly be faced with or experience (something hostile or difficult); or: to "meet (someone) unexpectedly." Justice Grant Board members frequently report the unexpected (and sometimes difficult) nature of their experience in performing their tasks. We take a risk when we open ourselves up face-toface to the reality of lives lived in poverty just outside our own

more comfortable lives. We take a risk of being changed, our hearts transformed, knowing that we will never return to our previous way of knowing the world and indeed ourselves. There is a profound mutuality in seeking encounter for the sake of those most in need as we discover (perhaps surprisingly) that we too are in deep need—spiritually hungry, seeking the way to loving neighbor and loving ourselves. In this way, serving on the Justice Grant Board becomes a sacred ministry of encounter, connecting grant board members with unexpected stories of human dignity and love, and connecting our faith community with the world. Relationships built between these organizations, the people they serve, and our own board members are an incredible gift.

If you would like to join the work of the Justice Grant Board, we invite you to consider participating in our Pax Christi Community leadership discernment process, meet members of our current Justice Grant Board and Justice Council, and discover if this ministry of encounter is calling to you. COMMITTED TO DISCIPLESHIP WITH JESUS CHRIST

What does it mean to be committed to being disciples of Jesus Christ? Take time to greet people, stop and listen to them and look them in the eye. There are ways to do that here at Pax Christi. By being a greeter, a Eucharistic Minister, adult altar server, or perhaps "behind-the-scenes," such as cleaning, ironing, and doing ordinary day-to-day things, you are living your life as a disciple.

Beyond Pax Christi, being a disciple in our cities, states, and global world means writing letters to the editor or standing up to injustices, in addition to extending our hands for ecumenical purposes. Many of us are involved in issues of immigration, homelessness, hunger, and housing. Being disciples of Jesus Christ calls us to do, to be giving of ourselves and going beyond our comfort zone to expand our understanding of being the face of Jesus in the world.

Our deepest fear is not that we are inadequate. Our deepest fear is that we are powerful beyond measure. It is our light, not our darkness, that most frightens us. We ask ourselves, Who am I to be brilliant, gorgeous, talented, fabulous? Actually, who are you not to be? Your playing small does not serve the world. We were born to make manifest the glory of God that is within us. And as we let our own light shine, we unconsciously give other people permission to do the same —Marianne Williamson, from her book, A Return To Love

FROM THE FOUNDING of the parish, the notion of living out one's baptismal commitment in discipleship was highlighted, emphasized, and celebrated as the way of coming to recognize one's gifts, and to use those gifts in the service of others. The re-emphasis on the important parish value of Lay Leadership, a synonym for responding to the call to be a follower of the Risen Christ, was intentional in crafting the new Strategic Plan. As one of the six values in the Strategic Plan, it states in part:

We co-lead and share in the responsibility of upholding the mission of the church.

The principle of lay leadership remains a key value to be upheld. As stated by the Second Vatican Council, the church is the People of God, the community of the baptized. In collaboration with the ordained we all hold responsibility for the life and the mission of the church.

In April, we will begin the discernment process for new members of the leadership councils. As we enact more aspects of the Strategic Plan, a sub-committee of the Community Council discussed with current staff and leaders about the names and direction of the current council structure. With this thoughtful discussion, it was decided that the names of councils will be:

Arts, Campus, and Gardens, with STEWARDSHIP as their primary value,

Care and Support, with SPIRITUAL GROWTH as their primary value,

Communications, with **INCLUSION** as their primary value,

Finance and Development, with STEWARDSHIP as their primary value,

Hospitality and Community Outreach, with INCLUSION as their primary value,

Justice, with JUSTICE as their primary value,

Lay Leadership Development and Engagement, with LAY LEADERSHIP as their primary value,

Lifelong Faith Formation, with SPIRITUAL GROWTH as their primary value, and

Worship, with GOD-CENTERED as their primary value.

Your engagement in leadership is needed as we design the next three to five years with the new Strategic Plan (www.paxchristi.com/strategicplan). Thirty-seven new members will help to fill all openings on these councils, including the newly-formed **Communications** Council. Please prayerfully consider your participation and nominate yourself or another member of Pax Christi to attend one of the Information Sessions on April 9 or 11. 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INTRODUCING BEFRIENDER MINISTRY

IMAGINE a time in your life when you were at a crossroads or feeling a heavy heart due to some suffering. Do you recall someone who sat with you to listen? A person who let you share your pain and confusion without judgment or the need to "fix" you? Friends like that can be rare, especially in our fix-it culture. So often people want to take the pain away in the quickest way possible, so they rush to offer solutions, change the subject with their own story, or simply tune out. When I think back on some of the hardest times in my life, I remember some of those fix-it friends but thankfully I also recall people who sat by my side and listened to me at length. They comforted and consoled me by their listening presence until I felt stronger and began to heal. These are the friends I cherish the most. David Oxberg says: "Being listened to is so close to being loved that most of us cannot tell the difference."

From its earliest days, Pax Christi community recognized the value of being fully present to those in need, so it initiated a Companion Ministry, which has been both an extension of the loving kindness of our faith community, and a tool for lay ministers to provide one-to-one listening and support to people in times of transition and difficult situations such as divorce, chronic or terminal illness, loss, or ongoing loneliness.

During the past few months, the Care and Support Council decided to review this important ministry through the lens of the Pax Christi Community's updated mission and purpose statement, as well as its new Strategic Plan. An ad hoc committee was established to review the current Companion Ministry model, then compare and contrast it with similar listening miniseries. Following their research and a discernment process, a recommendation was made to the Care and Support Council to replace Companion Ministry with the BeFrienders Ministry. This was approved at the January council meeting.

BeFriender Ministry is a local organization which educates, forms, and supports men and women as lay leaders for a listening ministry of care. Their website states, "Based on a model of mutuality, this national and ecumenical ministry heals hearts, energizes communities, and transforms a suffering world. A BeFriender is someone who listens with compassion, accepts people as they are, respects another's spiritual journey, and embodies the caring presence of God." This is a perfect complement to the values here at Pax Christi and offers a way to live out the mission and vision of Care and Support Ministry in deeper and wider ways.

The Care and Support Council plans to increase both the number of "listeners" and enhance parishioners' awareness of this important ministry. If you have the gift for listening or want to expand your gifts of compassion and empathy for those who are hurting, perhaps becoming a BeFriender may be the perfect place to share your gifts.

Please prayerfully consider joining us for an informational night on Monday, March 18. Attending the informational night will not commit you to become a BeFriender. However, for those who desire to move forward, 16 hours of training sessions are required. As a BeFriender, monthly continuing education sessions will be offered as well.
